Spiritual Growth

Our children are growing up in a fast moving world and society that places ever demanding pressures on their time, focus and attention. The opportunity to balance this with time for quiet contemplation and for personal reflection is more important than ever. Time that enables consideration and deeper thinking around some of the big questions that impact on who we are, how we relate to one another, understanding our place in the world and how then we should live are fundamental to our very being.

Spirituality is a thread which runs through our life, bringing hope, compassion, thankfulness, courage, peace and a sense of purpose and meaning to everyday, while reaching beyond the immediate world of the visible and tangible. It drives us to seek and stay true to values not ruled by material success. [1]

The requirement to provide spiritual development in the curriculum dates back to the 1944 Education Act, and for church schools is a core component of the school's ethos and theologically rooted Christian vision. As defined in the SIAMS framework, spiritual development is an intrinsic part of the curriculum and one that enables pupils and adults are to flourish spiritually through collective worship and the wider life of the school.

To support our schools in this important area, we are jointly hosting a primary school spirituality conference in conjunction with the Diocese of Liverpool on Friday 23rd June at the Smile Centre, Warrington. Further details and a link to book a place can be found on page 2. And finally, a mention to our Wirral Anglican Schools that have been working together on a spirituality project across their schools. This is culminating in a collective 'Spiritual Expressions - Big Sing' event later this month. We hope to be able to feature a report from the event in next month's edition.

Primary Schools Spirituality Conference

Join us on **Friday 23rd June** for our Primary Spirituality Conference, a joint collaboration with the Diocese of Liverpool at the Smile Centre, Warrington. The day will include case studies from a school in Liverpool and a group of our Wirral schools on their journeys towards understanding what spirituality can look like in schools, both of which will provide some really practical ideas and suggestions for use in your own school.

We 'll be spending the day with Ali Rice exploring ways to develop a shared understanding of spirituality in a Church school setting. We 'll be thinking about:

- SIAMS & spirituality
- Spiritual development research
- How to develop a shared understanding of spirituality
- Spirituality through reflection spaces, collective worship & the wider curriculum
- Case Studies from schools exploring their practical journeys of developing spirituality

Ali Rice, an independent consultant supporting Church schools to flourish will lead the day. She is passionate about helping Churches and Church schools to work together to transform their communities. Most recently she has been supporting Church schools to explore



their understanding of spirituality and how this can lead to spiritual flourishing for pupils and adults.



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Great Big Live Assembly for World Refugee Day

Please join Dr Krish Kandiah OBE, Director Sanctuary Foundation, for a special "Great Big Live Assembly" on World Refugee Day, Tuesday 20th of June, at 9.05am.



It is a tragic and gut-wrenching fact that around the world today over 36.5 million children have been forced to flee their homes due to war, famine, and terror to seek safety in another country. In fact, according to the UNHCR, over half of the world's refugees are children. Many will spend their entire childhoods away from home, sometimes separated from their families.

All children everywhere are growing up with the impact of this mass displacement of the world's children. Over the past two years, schools across the UK have done a brilliant job of welcoming tens of thousands of refugees from Ukraine and Afghanistan. Many of our classes are made up of recent refugees, children and grandchildren of former refugees, host families, and their friends.

In celebration of this, and in recognition of the refugee experience, the Great Big Live Assembly is convening a special national school assembly on World Refugee Day, Tuesday 20th of June, at 9.05am. For the first time, thanks to simple-to-use technology, schools are able to gather together via a live online broadcast that is inspirational, informative, and interactive.

The 20-minute Great Big Live Assembly will help children to see for themselves what life is like for many children around the world. It will be hosted by Dr Krish Kandiah OBE Director Sanctuary Foundation, and Daniel Orlova, a 9-year-old refugee from Ukraine now living in the UK. As well as discovering stories and statistics, children in schools around the UK will be able to connect with their counterparts in a refugee camp, thanks to our international partner World Vision. Our aim is for children across the UK to recognize and celebrate the contribution refugees make to life in the UK and demonstrate some of the ways we can all stand with refugees.

Celebrating Cultural Diversity at Bishops'

Bishops` Blue Coat CE High School recently celebrated the rich cultural, ethnic, and religious diversity of students in our school with our first highly successful Culture Week. The week was organised by our Diversity Group, a group of students who have received training from The Diana Award to become anti-racist ambassadors across the school. Culture Week involved a wide range of enrichment activities during lessons, Form Time, and lunch times to celebrate and broaden our students` understanding of diversity in our school.



The highlight of the week was our Culture Fair which involved students from over 20 different countries and cultures sharing their language and cultural heritage with others in our school. Parents also sent in recipes for dishes, some of which were served in our canteen. We believe that to truly live `*life in all of its fullness*` (John 10: 10), we need to create a school culture where tolerance, respect and understanding of all is the norm. There was such a spirit of openness and joy in our school this week, as our students and staff listened to each other and learnt from each other about the cultures, backgrounds and languages that form the colourful tapestry of our school community.



Halton St Mary's

We had been reading the book 'This morning I met a whale' and this highlighted to the children in a powerful way the danger that plastics and packaging can cause our world.

Our starting point of raising awareness was created by pupils reflecting upon creation and the stewardship of it, then we introduced them to the idea of pollution and over use of plastics, moving to what action could they take at home and also our impact of choices in school, for example recycling of paper, card and plastic. All this was considered so we could "Bring on a better world."

The children organised rotas for picking up litter in the school grounds and others wrote to leading supermarkets to ask them to reduce the amount of packaging and plastic that they use. Marks and Spencer have replied and have
